# Deaths Of Members

#### Alan Montgomery (1927-2018)

For many, many years, Alan Montgomery was the club's solicitor and only passed the baton to Bernie Allen in relatively recent times.

It was said that he turned out for Grammar in his playing days, possibly in the backline, before he joined the Auckland University club, discharging many years of service as that club's solicitor before Mike Cormack and Bob Burnes took up the role.

Montgomery was actively involved in the purchase of 'The House that Jack Built' in the early 1970s and he was a cheerful, constant presence at the Barbarians right up until, and after, the time the clubhouse moved high up into the north stand at Eden Park.

He was a good communicator, a wise practitioner and successful commercial lawyer who enjoyed a punt too. He started work on the rewording of the old club constitution in the early 2010s.

#### Kevyn Male (1943-2018)

Successful businessman, prolific author, teacher, antique collector, long-range goalkicker, versatile forward, character of rugby.

Such were the many faces of Kevyn (KG) Male, who died in December after a long illness.

Male, who could play flanker, lock or prop, appeared 18 times for Auckland from 1964-70, scoring one try. He debuted in the same game as his Otahuhu clubmate Peter Murdoch in '64. By that stage he had already turned out for the Centurions club and the NZ Colts. Male was known for his hard-nosed attitude on the field, but he was a softie off the pitch.

He played two first-class games for the Barbarians in 1972, by which stage he was at Grammar, winning a Gallaher Shield with that club to go with those he enjoyed at Otahuhu.

Male started up The Three Bears in Newmarket and, in 1988, Route 66. He is a past president of the Newmarket Business Association.

In the late '90s, he authored two entertaining books, out of 25 he penned on a raft of topics, on grassroots rugby.

His son Todd, one of three children, is a Barbarian.

#### Geoff Moon (1966-2019)

Geoff Moon, who died suddenly in January while doing some coaching in Italy, was one of just four men to have won both Gallaher Shield club titles and Auckland 1A First XV titles.

Two others – Sir Graham Henry and Grant Hansen – are Barbarians.

Moon was known as 'The Godfather of south Auckland rugby' having extensive involvement as a player and coach at schools and club level. He was especially revered at Aorere College. In 2000 he guided Otahuhu to the Gallaher Shield title, the last south Auckland club to do so.

From 2013-18 he coached the Mt Albert Grammar First XV, claiming the 2016 1A and national Top 4 titles. In 2016-17 he was also the Auckland assistant coach.

'Moonie' had a priceless ability to relate to everyone, including referees (!) and his funeral in January at MAGS brought rugby people from far and wide. Barbarians Eroni Clarke and Keven Mealamu were among those who paid tributes.



#### MEMBER PROFILE MONALISA URQUHART



Monalisa Urquhart (nee Codling) is still breaking new ground.

The 41-year-old is the first woman to serve on the Barbarians committee and indeed is the first member to give birth. She now has two boys, Michael and George, with husband, actor and teacher Gerald Urquhart. But she only physically missed one committee meeting in 2018. No problems. Conference call. Such is the committee's embrace of new technology.

She was a hard-nosed lock for the Black Ferns in 30 tests from 1998-2010, winning no less than four Women's Rugby World Cups, not to mention multiple provincial titles with the Auckland Storm and club titles with College Rifles. In 2003 she was adjudged New Zealand women's player of the year.

Joining the Barbarians in 2015, among the second intake of lady members, Urquhart has thrown herself into the club activities, and loves it. In 2017 she joined the hard-working and increasingly diverse committee.

"It's just been a really lovely environment. I took an hiatus from a rugby for a few years. I got a bit stale. But I was ready to dip my toes back in. I love the values of the club helping the youth. For me, with a young family, it's been a good base. I

like the diversity and hanging out with rugby people," she says.

Her and many of her old Black Ferns mates have many stories to tell to add to the rugby tales of the men. There are now 16 lady members, no less than 11 from that trailblazing world champion 1998 Black Ferns.

But do not think for a moment that Urquhart is just some hard-out, obsessed rugby chick who can only talk on one subject. She has a wide range of interests, loves to paint, having had works commissioned, enjoys music, travel, watching basketball and fully embraces technology, at least via Facebook and What's App. Twitter not so much.

She works for the British Council in its Auckland office as the finance and operations manager. The birth of George last month means she has taken some leave, but there are projects in the pipelines, so she will not be fulltime at home for long.

Last year she, among others, enjoyed representing the Barbarians at the Top 4 tournament in Palmerston North. Her suggestion led to the awarding of an MVP from the girls' event, which went to Kiriana Nolan of Hamilton GHS. Urquhart stepped in for Ron Williams to speak at the Friday night dinner at the Top 4. It capped a big year, having earlier received her Black Ferns cap, an emotional occasion.

She has a voice and the committee hears it. Urquhart has proven herself a worthy Barbarian. She is not just a staunch advocate of women's rugby, in an unprecedented growth period, but for all levels of the game. We love having her.

### AGM REVIEW



*Mike Mills'* life membership was the highlight of the 82nd Barbarians' Annual General meeting held on November 28.

The former All Blacks trialist has spent a lifetime in the game as a player, coach and then driver of much of the Barbarians' active rugby involvement. In the last 16 years, firstly as club captain then as President in 2012-13, Mills worked hard to secure high profile fixtures for the club, such as the 2010 and 2015 clashes versus the Maori All Blacks and the 2017 match against the British and Irish Lions in Whangarei. He was also at the forefront of the Barbarians' involvement in schools rugby, be it the Top 4 tournament, the NZ Barbarians Schools or the NZ Barbarians Area Schools.

Former All Black **Alan 'AJ' Whetton** assumes the role of President in place of **Neil Cullimore**, who is still making steady progress after his accident. We thank **Ron Williams** for his work as President, effectively over three years.

Two new committee members were named, former All Blacks centre and recently honoured life member of the Ponsonby club **Joe Stanley**, along with former Counties Manukau RFU chief executive **Nick Sheppard**. Former Manu Samoa rep **Craig Glendinning** steps up to the junior Vice-President role in place of the late **Dylan Mika**, while **Richard Turner** steps down from the committee.

An extremely busy year for the Barbarians yielded a commendable surplus of \$913,310.

\*Congratulations to Rex Davy for his New Year's honour as a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit after a lifetime's involvement with the game either for his beloved Te Atatu/Waitakere club and then Auckland Rugby as manager of some of the great teams of the 1990s.

\*Well done too to Glenn Wahlstrom who was made a life member of Auckland Rugby at the union's AGM. The former test referee was previously chairman of Auckland Rugby. On the same night, Eroni Clarke was made the union's President, a tremendous honour for the former All Black and Auckland centurion.

\*Keven Mealamu, who was made a Barbarian in 2011, is the latest recipient of the NZRPA Kirk Award, named after Barbarian David Kirk. The former hooker has not been idle since retirement in 2015, and his work has been recognised by his peers for his 'outstanding contribution to his fellow players on and off the field.'

\*Congratulations too to DJ Forbes on his special merit honour at the World Rugby Awards in Monaco in late November. The 36-year-old is still held in the highest regard, especially in sevens circles.

\*Our member from Manawatu, Clive Akers, one of New Zealand's foremost rugby historians and co-editor of the *Rugby Almanack*, has put together, over some 35 years, no less, an impressive listing of all New Zealand firstclass players from 1870-2015, entitled the *New Zealand Rugby Register*.
